Hi. Welcome to our first class on bridge Conventions. In each lecture this semester, we'll learn a new convention for bidding. Hope you enjoy and learn a lot. You can reach me for any questions at:

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The Stayman Convention

This convention was invented by George Rapee and popularized by Sam Stayman. It is a bid that asks a question.

Suppose your partner opens the bidding with one notrump. You would like to know if your partner has a four-card major, because your hand is:

A K 8 3

J 10 5 4

Q 3

10 6 4

Opposite your partner's one notrump opening bid, you have enough points to bid a game. However, you don't know if the game should be three notrump, or four-of-a-major. So you "ask" by bidding two clubs, which is the Stayman convention.

Partner You

1 NT 2 C = Partner, do you have a four-card major?

If partner has a four card major, he bids it. If not, he bids two diamonds, which says nothing about diamonds.

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Partner has no four-card major, so you bid three notrump:

Your side will take at least three spades, one club, and five diamonds.

Partner has four hearts with you, so you raise to four hearts:

Four spades is a good contract, whereas it's possible to go down in three notrump if someone has five diamonds.

Question: What if I have only one four-card major?

You bid Stayman. If partner has the same four-card major you have, you will bid game in that major. If partner has no four-card major, or the other four-card major, you will bid notrump.

Suppose you hold:

Question: How many points must I have to bid Stayman?

You need at least 8 points to bid Stayman. If your 8 points are "bad" points, that is, you have no aces or kings or singletons, you should pass. If you have 9 or more points, go ahead and bid Stayman.

Note that with 8-9 points you do not necessarily have enough for game, so you must invite. Suppose you have:

If partner has a minimum, he will pass your second bid and play the contract in a part-score. If he has a maximum, he will go to game.

Question: If I open one notrump and my partner bids Stayman, what should I do with two four-card majors?

Bid your spades first. If partner does not raise spades, bid your hearts next.

In this auction, the 3H bid shows a minimum hand for a 1NT opening. If you hold a maximum hand and 4-4 in the majors, you bid 4H over 2NT.

Here partner has enough to bid game and you correct the contract with four hearts, because you know he holds four hearts. Otherwise he would not have used Stayman.
